

As the Sydney Jewish Museum put it, « Gagman is a 21st century Scheherazade, a tale of our time. » It's the tale of a man who survives the Nazi concentration camps by telling jokes to the commandant. Each time he lives to see another day, another prison does not. And so ultimately it is about survivor's guilt to the extreme and explores how we make meaning in a post-Holocaust world.

The author, Dov Fedler, was one of South Africa's most beloved and preeminent political cartoonists before his retirement in 2016. He first imagined *Gagman* while in an Israeli hotel room in 1986 and the story has never stopped evolving since then.

There were so many drafts and versions that Dov lost sight of how to piece it all together. He also had experienced powerful bursts of self-doubt: is he qualified to write a story about the camps? And is it okay to use humor to do so? And so Gagman spent many years stored away in boxes until 2018 when Dov became determined to finish what he had started. That's when his Sydney-based daughter Joanne Fedler, an internationally bestselling author, stepped in to sort through those 17 drafts in order to help craft what is now a complete manuscript, 35 years later.


Gagman is *not* a graphic novel but a novel with some illustrations that complement the story; they do not *tell* the story.

Dov Fedler spent fifty years drawing for *The Star*, South Africa's leading daily newspaper. His memoirs *Out of Line* were published in 2015.

Joanne Fedler is the internationally bestselling author of 12 books, which have been translated into many different languages and have sold over 750 000 copies worldwide. She is a Fulbright scholar, has a Master's degree in Law from Yale, set up and ran an advocacy centre to end violence against women in South Africa and has spent her life fighting for women's rights.



Dr Browne's task is simple enough; he is to interview the women (who are currently being held in jail in deplorable conditions) as well as their accusers in order to present his opinion before the court.


At a time when the burden is on the accused to prove their innocence, the villagers' accusations are seemingly insurmountable. As a man of both science and religion, Dr Browne is the ideal candidate for determining what is true. But as his investigation deepens and the trial proceeds it becomes clear to him that the truth isn't necessarily what people are seeking.



Khadra has often explored Algerian and other Arab countries' civil wars, depicting Muslim conflicts and reality, the attraction of radical Islamism to those alienated by the incompetence and hypocrisy of politicians, and conflicts between East and West.

He has twice been honored by the Académie française, winning both the Médaille de Vermeil (2001) and Grand Prix de Littérature (2011). He lives in France.



The noble family of Inverkillen lives upstairs at Loch Down Abbey and everyone else, well, they're downstairs of course. There are countless members of the family, most of whom stay at home tiring themselves out by doing what can only be described as nothing.

It's the 1930s and a mysterious illness is spreading over Scotland; the Nanny is struck first and so someone in the family, maybe a parent for once, will have to look after the children. But no, that duty falls upon Iris, the family ward taken in from the orphanage as young girl. Then Lord Inverkillen is found dead but it's not the virus that killed him. No, he drowned while fishing in the river that runs through the estate. The inspector declares it an accident but Mrs MacBain, the head housekeeper, isn't so convinced. She'll have to do some digging in between chores. As no one is allowed in or out — because of the illness — the residents of the house are her only suspects.

Lord Inverkillen's death is just the beginning of the unrest the family will be forced to go through over the coming months. There isn't enough money to pay the death taxes so they may have to sell the house (gasp!). And to top it off, one by one the servants fall ill with the virus and leave the Inverkillen's mostly to their own devices. The horror! (Of having to make their own beds.)

Loch Down Abbey is a playful parody of that great British tradition of portraying nobility and domestics living under the same roof with weddings to plan, spouses to mourn, elaborate five course meals to serve (while masked), titles to fight over, affairs to conceal, honour to protect, illegitimate children to hide, deaths to investigate and much, much more.



Beth Cowan-Erskine is originally from a small town in Wyoming. She moved to the UK in 2010 and started an Interior Architecture firm. She lives on a farm in the Cotswolds with her Scottish husband but longs for the Highlands. This is her first novel.


Maybe, in the end, he's not such a good man after all. But maybe not everything is as it seems.

Martin Bormann, Hitler's personal secretary, is tasked with finding the officer who is the most qualified for this unusual mission. After having studied countless profiles, Bormann is intrigued by a young sharpshooter who has already successfully completely several dangerous missions: Captain Florian Weiter.

During a mussion, the B-17 that Gable is flying is shot down and crashes in the Chevreuse Valley, near Paris. But not before Gable managed to eject himself and parachute to safety, helped by the Resistants. But German radars were able to locate the crash site and so Captain Weiter is sent to France which leads to the improbable meeting between Adolf Hitler and Clark





A few years later Mary and Percy meet and fall in love in the Godwin bookshop near Black Friar's Bridge. At first their romance seems doomed —Percy is a well-known atheist and already has a wife and children, and Mary is only seventeen and under the care of her father and his overbearing second wife. But they consider such impediments trivial and are soon on their way to Ireland, to Switzerland, and across Europe (with Mary's flighty half-sister Claire in tow).

Upon reaching Lake Geneva they find lodgings near where the notorious poet Lord Byron and his peculiar personal physician John Polidori are staying—the same Lord Byron Claire seduced back in London, her reasoning being that if Mary can have a poet, why can't she? And so begins the summer when Mary Shelley will begin writing her novel about a man who brings to life a creature of his own making, Percy and Lord Byron will debate politics and poetry in the midst of lightning storms, Polidori will begin writing his novel about a man with a taste for human blood.






