

The book

Shimun waits for the wind to drop so that the plane can take us into the heart of the land. We have bought supplies of food to last us at least two months in the bush. I have been gifted with a pair of snowshoes woven from strips of rawhide. Maniten has knitted a pair of woolen socks for me and made a fur hat out of Arctic hare. Nuenau loans me a pair of her high-rise moccasins that she slips into my bag with these words: "You have no idea how happy you will be in Nutshimit. You can walk, paddle, admire the lake and the mountains, hunt, cut firewood. It never stops. Shimun's face lights up. He is not the same man there. You need to come with us to understand." "The forest is our father's home," adds Penassin.


A young woman born on the other side of the ocean begins a journey alone. She heads north, stubbornly continuing beyond Tadoussac, past Baie-Comeau. She will only stop once she has reached Ekuanitshit, where she meets two sisters, Penassin and Nuenau, and their father Shimun. With the arrival of fall, Shimun invites the young woman to join him on a trip through Nutshimit, in the heart of the Quebec-Labrador Peninsula.

En suivant Shimun paints a vibrant picture of the Innu community at a turning point in its history. Although the daily life of the Innu is heavily impacted by modernity and contact with people from very far away, the call of the land still exerts a magnetic pull, and the spirit of hospitality of this nomadic people still dictates how they treat unexpected guests.

The author

Laure Morali lives in Montreal. Her anthology *Aimititau! Parlons-nous!* (Mémoire d'encrier, 2008 and 2017) helped strengthen the ties between Quebec's and Indigenous writers.

The author

The book

If only my girlfriend were with me [...]. I admire the way she can make the most outlandish purchases with almost lyrical nonchalance. I tend to let the object take the lead, to set myself up before it, receptive to any strange force it emits, as though some trinket made in Myanmar could totally change the course of my life.

A man in search of a gift feels the aisles of a department store close in around him. Another man in the middle of a divorce is trapped by the smartphone of a stranger that enchants him like her siren's song. Parents who have come to the big city to help their son move interpret a vacant parking space as a miracle. A patriarch is convinced that the dirt road that borders his property is responsible for the tragedy that has befallen him.

In a world in which God has long since died, history has ended, and grand narratives have been replaced by advertisements and tabloids, the characters in *Reliques profanes* wander aimlessly along the path of meaning and destiny like a flock of lost sheep. Subject to the legion temptations of consumerism and technology, they seek transcendence in what surrounds them: every-day items, living spaces, and sundry debates. They hope to elevate themselves ever so slightly above their sad realities, at the risk of falling into idolatry.

Anchored in worlds that are sometimes absurd, sometimes dreamlike, sometimes fantastical, the 14 short stories in this collection are playful yet unsettling in their questioning of the current human condition, in which the material and the virtual constantly increase their dominance over our lives like the twin heads of a hydra.




Taking a break from the scorching heat of the Caribbean and the characters populating the expansive mosaic of the *Soifs* series, Marie-Claire Blais reconnects with the people at the heart of two important novels that she published decades ago: *Les Nuits de l'Underground* and *L'Ange de la solitude*.

René suddenly feels like an old man and is both comforted and annoyed by the officious care provided by his Russian nurse, Olga. She insists on reminding René that, despite having a masculine name, despite what René wants everyone to think, René is a woman. René just wants to keep dressing elegantly, as in the old days of playing piano in women-only cabarets. What if a lover decides to visit? What about Louise, for example? She always loved René but refused to be just one of the assorted "strays" that flocked around the pianist. Or perhaps Lali will come—the German doctor, René's "little brother," who devoted her life to the fight against AIDS. And what about Nathalie, to whom René gave everything, absolutely everything?

In Rene's orbit, we encounter the writer Johnie, the musician Doudouline, the theologian Polydor, the painter l'Abeille, and Gérard, a lover of forbidden pleasures. They support each other, offering warm shelter from the cold, snowy world outside. They celebrate together, intoxicated, convincing each other that no ill fate can reach them in their cocoon. They reminisce about past loves, tragedies, fights. They steel themselves to take on the monster of bigotry and intolerance whenever it rears its ugly head, revealing their inexhaustible thirst for rebellion.

Marie-Claire Blais brings to life pivotal moments in the fight for queer rights that characterized the last century.

The author

Simon Roy teaches literature at Collège Lionel-Groulx. He has published two novels: *Ma vie rouge Kubrick* (Boréal, 2014; Prix des libraires du Québec) and *Owen Hopkins, Esquire* (Boréal, 2016).

The book

On February 5, 1988, on the set of Bernard Pivot's famous French talk show, a Quebec author makes a splash. Under the fascinated gaze of Jacques Attali and Pierre Assouline, Réal Lessard talks about his autobiography, *L'Amour du faux*, which has just been released to great acclaim by a renowned Paris publishing house.

The audience is told the tale of a multifaceted painter. Lessard recounts the extraordinary life he has lived alongside some of the greatest forgers of his era. Notably, he talks about Fernand Legros, the merchant who became Lessard's lover and introduced him to "high society"; Elmyr de Hory, alias the "princess of Transylvania," who was the subject of a film by Orson Welles; and the writer Clifford Irving, who caused a massive scandal by publishing the fake memoirs of multimillionaire Howard Hughes.

Lessard also talks about his artistic talent, clear from early in his childhood in Mansonville. He explains how a number of his paintings found their way into the galleries of some of the most famous museums in the world, even though they carried someone else's name. He is, for example, responsible for certain paintings attributed to Matisse, Van Dongen, and Picasso—or so he says.

But who remembers Réal Lessard today? His presence is fleeting, appearing and disappearing, leaving nothing but a cloud of mystery in its wake. And who is he, really? A genius equal to the masters he imitates? An artist with a misguided calling? A con man? A defender of true art opposed to the snobbish pretentions of the so-called experts?

The author of *Ma vie rouge Kubrick* embarks on a search for the "true" Réal Lessard. On his journey, he shares his reflections on a number of questions that have always been close to his heart. Is it possible to draw a line between truth and fiction? What's in a name? Why is it so important? Do we have the right to tell someone else's story?


The book

Montreal is in a state of shock. The body of a fourth woman, brutally tortured and killed, has just been found in an alley. This is clearly the work of a prolific, meticulous, perfectionist killer in thrall to a gruesome ritual. But neither the police nor the media have been able to unearth a single clue to lead them to the murderer.

Journalist Marie Pinelli is pressured by her boss Jean-Marc to get the scoop. Why are the police fumbling the case? Why has the body of a disembowelled cat been found next to each victim? What is the significance of the neatly folded clothes? Marie groans. Her herniated disks are agonizing, the sexism of her bosses is exasperating. Nevertheless, her journalistic instincts take over. She will move heaven and earth to crack this case, even if it means putting her own life in danger by getting too close to the psychopath.

In her first thriller, Michèle Ouimet displays a peerless talent for bringing likeable characters to life, portraying the hectic atmosphere of the newsroom and capturing the less-than-heroic drudgery of police work. Notably, we are introduced to François Prévost, who is in charge of the investigation and cannot help but be moved by the human drama that he witnesses every day.



The author

Louis Hamelin has written several novels, including *La Rage* (Governor General's Literary Award) and *La Constellation du lynx* (Prix des libraires du Québec, Prix des collégiens). He is also a translator and the editor of "L'œil américain", a nature writing series published by Boréal.

The book

In April 1843, the famous naturalist John James Audubon embarked, from St. Louis, on what would prove to be his final expedition. His ambition was to collect as many specimens as possible to immortalize them in the book he had been writing on the "viviparous quadrupeds"-mammals-of North America. Born Jean-Jacques Audubon in Saint-Domingue (the future Haiti) and raised in France, he felt at home aboard the Omega. French was the main language spoken on the boat, which flew the U.S. flag as it steamed up the Missouri River. His guide was Étienne Provost, a celebrated French-Canadian coureur de bois. This part of the continent-from New Spain to the Great Lakes-was inhabited by Indigenous peoples and trappers. It teemed with astounding amounts of wildlife. The trekkers didn't hold back as they pillaged the fauna, shooting anything that moved in the name of science, or perhaps simply from the giddiness men feel when holding a gun.

Louis Hamelin explores the myths of an entire continent as one sails upriver. He walks in the Audubon's footsteps, following his trail by car in the plains of North Dakota, where packs of SUVs have replaced the herds of grazing bisons. His odyssey ends with a bender in Livingston, Montana, in the company of a rising literary star and admirer of Jim Harrison. Les Crépuscules de la Yellowstone is a poignant homage to all the lives and dreams buried under the crushing weight of highway asphalt.




The author

She divides her time between Quebec and Florida. Her masterpiece, *Soifs*, was published in German (Suhrkamp), Spanish (Random House) and Italian (Safarà) in 2020 and 2021.

The book

A small town in the American South, just before the first light of dawn. A policeman on horseback approaches a homeless black man who's sleeping in the street. The old man is beaten down by misery and drugs. He berates the cop furiously, rattling off a litany of injustices his ancestors suffered at the hands of white people. After all, doesn't a police officer represent the order to which all citizens are subject? Then a transvestite happens by, on the way home from a bar. He tries to reason with the policeman. 





Book 2: Indochine







The book

Foreign Rights

With a catalogue of over 2000 titles, Boréal is a Canadian trade publisher active in international markets. Over the years, through direct distribution in Europe, co-editions, and the selling of translation rights, we have established a strong network of partners.

We have great success on an international level with Soifs (Marie-Claire Blais), Un dimanche à la piscine à Kigali (Gil Courtemanche), La petite fille qui aimait trop les allumettes (Gaétan Soucy), Un lien familial (Nadine Bismuth) and Explication de la nuit (Edem Awumey), sold in many countries.

Moreover, many titles-such as Borderline (Marie-Sissi Labrèche), C'est pas moi je le jure! (Bruno Hébert) and C'est le cœur qui meurt en dernier (Robert Lalonde)-made it to the silver screen after their film rights were sold.

Boréal is also engaged in an important translation program (mainly Canadian writers), offering to readers works by Margaret Atwood, Michael Ondaatje, Alice Munro, Charles Taylor, Miriam Toews, Rachel Cusk, Jonathan Franzen and many others.

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
