


The story of Laure (40) and Clément (50), two Parisians whose lives feel lacklustre. In nervous and sharp prose, Maria Pourchet offers us a vivid, powerful, and humorous novel about love, which is terrifyingly more serious and more dangerous than we think.

Laure is a university Professor who is married and the mother of two daughters. Outwardly her life seems happy and conventional, but internally she feels restless and trapped. Clément is single and lives alone with his beloved elderly dog. He works in finance, which he finds soulless, and feels unmotivated and misunderstood both personally and professionally. When the two meet and begin an affair, they both hope that the passion of their illicit partnership will be the catalyst for change. What they hadn't counted on, however, is the intrusion of Laure's teenage daughter Véra, who secretly involves herself in their relationship by spying on them and ultimately answering a personal ad to become Clément's dog sitter.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR: Maria Pourchet's previous book was an unforgettable narrative non-fiction title TOUTES LES FEMMES SAUF UNE, published by Pauvert in 2018, a powerful feminist text about maternity that advocates the need for sisterhood and solidarity amongst women. In the early 1980s, Jean Roscoff was a promising young intellectual: a graduate of the Ecole Normale Supérieure, an activist with SOS Racisme, and a dandy in his spare time. Thirty-five years later, he is a divorced, alcoholic, retired university teacher. He decided to resume the work of his youth on a mysterious American poet who was a friend of Sartre and Beauvoir before killing himself at the wheel of his car, deep in the Essonne region, in the early 1960s. He then set about writing The Seer of Etampes, an essay that he saw as his last chance. But as soon as the book was published, a blog post criticized him for not mentioning that the poet was black. From then on, social networks and the media went wild, and the descent into hell began. Accused of racism, harassed on the Internet and in his daily life, Jean Roscoff finds himself at the heart of a controversy that he cannot control. Overwhelmed, he has not seen the era change and his universalist ideals guestioned in favor of a more radical struggle.




Through a century of existence of the zoo of Rome, Pascal Janovjak tells the evolution of our relationship with animals, taking us into the alleys of a now controversial place, which remains a place of wonder for children, but disturbing for adults.

Inaugurated in 1911, the Rome zoo owes its architectural distinctiveness to the boldness of Hagenbeck. First and foremost a merchant, he supplied circuses and zoos with wild animals. But Hagenbeck was also one of the first champions of training animals humanely and of zoos without cages. It was from this perspective that he conceived of a new approach to zoological parks in general and to the zoo of Rome in particular. In this book, the reader is immersed in the history of this extraordinary garden which takes in the story of Raffaele de Vico, the architect who created an aviary reminiscent of an observatory, a Swiss sculptor of genius who was half- mad, Mussolini and his pet lioness, the pope, and the writer Salman Rushdie, as well as a host of other characters. The reader is also introduced to a man and a woman who were destined to meet each other: Giovanna, who has been in charge of marketing at the zoo since 2010, and Chahine, an architect who gives up his day job after being drawn by the strangeness of the buildings which connects with his own eventful past.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR: Born in 1975 in Basel of a French mother and a Slovakian father, Pascal Janovjak studied comparative literature and art history in Strasbourg and then departed to the Middle East, first to Jordan as a development aid volunteer and then to Lebanon, where he teaches literature at the University of Tripoli. In this confined, tense setting, in which words and gestures are imbued with rage and hope, Edem Awumey takes us on a journey along the contemporary cotton road, from the African savannahs to the American South, from luxurious Berlin lounges to the glyphosate-drenched fields of Indian Rajasthan, to the valleys of Uzbekistan coated in white fibres and the mills of Dacca, Bangladesh. The novel takes us through a world struggling against the diktats of multinational corporations. It is a cry for freedom that has been suppressed for far too long and that is, at long last, erupting with thunderous violence.

In the same vein as Sally Rooney's phenomenally successful novel Normal People, which charts the different stages of a relationship between two people from different class backgrounds, Philippe Besson's book is similar in that it begins with a clandestine relationship between two 17-year-old boys from different backgrounds at the same school and then reconsiders that liaison at a later stage.

Just outside a hotel in Bordeaux, Philippe chances upon a young man who bears a striking resemblance to his first love. What follows is a look back at the relationship he's never forgotten, a hidden affair with a gorgeous boy named Thomas during their last year of high school. Without ever acknowledging they know each other in the halls, they steal time to meet in secret, carrying on a passionate, world-altering affair.


Set in the same small town in south-western France where Philippe Besson grew up, and dedicated to a Thomas Andrieu who died in 2016, just as the character Thomas Andrieu does in the novel. The narrator is Philippe Besson, a successful writer living in Paris, remembering his adolescence.

Philippe and Thomas are 17 years old and at school together; they've never spoken because Philippe is in those classes that prepare the children of bourgeois families to progress in their education, and Thomas isn't. Philippe's father is the headmaster of a primary school; Thomas's has a small dairy

farm and sells the produce of his vineyard to local cognac distilleries, while his mother comes from a family of Spanish migrant labourers. Across the class divide Philippe yearns for Thomas's beautiful and unattainable self-possession, though he never dares look at him directly. He assumes that Thomas is straight, and oblivious to him - that he "doesn't know me at all". Philippe is clear already that he's gay, and although he doesn't mind being different ("I wouldn't follow packs. Out of instinct, I despised packs"), he knows better than to avow it openly to his schoolfriends. One amazing day in the playground, however, it turns out that Thomas has noticed Philippe after all, and has been cherishing a secret passion for him, precisely because he's different. "Because you are not like all the others, because I don't see anyone but you and you don't even realise it ... Because you will leave and we will stay." There follow sexual encounters in the secret places Thomas knows: the locker room at the basketball court, a shed next to the football field, eventually in Philippe's teenage bedroom. The sex is raw and transforming, but they don't talk much - in public Thomas won't admit to knowing Philippe. Eventually the strains of shame and secrecy are unbearable, and he leaves to live in Spain with his mother's family.





Drawn there by a curious sense of purpose, she learns about its his- tory and the past conflicts that continue to haunt it, but she comes to it with a fresh and optimistic pair of eyes. A deeply moving portrait of a man haunted by the ghosts of the past. Bleu nuit is a powerfully human novel, a tale of the lost, forgotten souls on our streets, a portrayal of a magnificent character of equal light and shade, struggling with all his might to escape his demons.

"I walk a tightrope. I am the high-wire act crossing the line stretched taut across the abysses of memory. I must not fall. I am on a wire that risks snapping if I put a foot wrong".

The author of this intense monologue spent years keeping his memories on a short leash. A journalist frozen into inaction at the thought of facing the world outside, he lives locked away in his flat, unbeknown to his employers. One phone call is all it takes to tip his life into chaos: Alma, the only woman he ever loved, has died. He cannot bring himself to attend her funeral. The very next day, he forces himself outside, dumping his keys in a drain and deciding to live in the street.

He sleeps somewhere new every night, always within easy reach of the Père Lachaise cemetery, seeking to exorcise the violent memories that assail him, the obsessive images of deep blue sea and scorching sun. Taking refuge in his newfound rootlessness, he fills his weeks with fleeting daily contacts with a handful of women and girls whose names rhyme with his lost love, Alma. Unwittingly, as if the figures had much to teach him about himself, buried memories wash over him: orchards in bloom, the tang of seaweed, the sweet scent of aniseed and jasmine.

He stops fighting the crushing tidal wave of the past that no ritual, no drink, no drugs could hold in check. Watched only by the faithful Minuit, a dog he found lying on a grave, he drops his guard, devoting his turbulent nights to retelling the living nightmare he has struggled in for so long – a nightmare he sought to leave behind when he crossed the Mediterranean.

This beautiful debut novel is a detailed, deeply affecting account of the author's ongoing battle with memories of a childhood blown to ruins.

Outside, the gunfire intensifies. The children clustered in the school yard wait for their parents, tears pouring down their cheeks. The young girl narrating the arresting opening chapter is alone in remaining dry-eyed: she is just pleased that her "giant" is coming to collect her earlier than usual. Clutching one of his huge fingers in her tiny hand, she is sure to make it through the chaos safely.

Never complain. Hide your fears. Keep quiet. Leave home after home behind. The child born in Beirut during the civil war is used to it all.

The girl's father, whose narrative voice alternates with her own, knows that in this city of ruins, his power is negligible. As an intellectual, his refusal to join a particular faction or party will always count against him. Try though he might to reassure his family with his jokes and the tiny patches of garden he cultivates every time they move somewhere new, all he has to offer them is the knot of fear in his belly, his lucidity, and his silence.

The year his daughter turns twelve, the family goes into exile in Paris, leaving him behind. At first an outstanding student at her secondary school, she finds herself increasingly at odds with the world around her. Even in motherhood she never feels part of a group, seeking consolation in the presence of trees, flowers, and above all her beloved weeds, that she cannot bring herself to uproot.

Her twin brother suffers from epilepsy. Marguerite watches over him, literally keeping him alive. Her mother would have preferred that Marguerite had been sick rather than her brother. She is constantly scolding and overburdening her daughter with chores. To make up for and escape from her confined existence, Marguerite clings to a vital manifestation of life: light and color. She will earn her spot in the family business, but only after a fight.

Her entire life she has walked a line, a path circumscribed by Pont Notre-Dame and the Petit Pont. Every day, she crosses the fle de la Cité, from the illumination workshop to her godfather's apothecary, where she buys pigments. Until the day Marguerite meets Daoud. He's a Moor – her people's sworn enemy.

Before him, Marguerite's physical world was clearly defined. She was tenacious for what was essential and knew how to make calculated compromises, but adventure and risk-taking used to be limited to abstractions and art. But all that will change with Daoud. Meeting him will force her out of herself and into life and the world.


Freely inspired by the remarkable career of Judge Thiel – the first to have brought a serial killer to justice in France (the Bastille killer Guy Georges) and one of the leading counterterrorism magistrates –the portrait of an ageing man who was brought low by political machinations but ultimately is still an honest and upright man.

Judge Wagner has little else to do but drink and constantly revisit the triumphs of the past: the major criminal and terrorist cases in which he excelled a decade ago. And this is what he is doing on one particular day in the Alsatian town of Colmar, drinking at a Christmas market and maintaining a sceptical distance from the festivities, the twinkling lights and the odour of mulled wine. In the pocket of his overcoat is the reassuring Manurhin, a revolver that the authorities allowed him to keep for his own protection. In Corsica, the threats scrawled on the walls are a reminder that he made enemies in his work who will never forget for as long as he is still alive. On Christmas Eve as the judge is on his way to his sister's, two kids in a souped-up orange Honda Prélude hold him up, and for a moment he is convinced that this dark vendetta is finally going to reach its climax on a B-road in the middle of winter. But his attackers, armed with a hunting gun, content themselves with relieving him of his wallet and his revolver. The judge sees the incident as an opportunity to don his old investigator's hat once again and track down the flamboyant orange vehicle. After a few days of online research into the little world of blowhards, would-be hoodlums and jointsmoking, scooter-riding teenagers, he manages to identify his two assailants, Rollo and Johann. He decides to make contact with the latter, who seems to be the more malleable and less stupid of the two, and a strange little relationship develops between this ageing magistrate with a liking for drink and a rather lost lad who lives with his grandparents, skips school and tries to get by with various little scams. Both get something out of it: a way of overcoming solitude, a favour given, the hint of a brighter future, and the chance to open a book to get some education.

But one afternoon, Johann steals the Manurhin for a second time behind Wagner's back in order to impress a girl – at the very moment when the Corsicans have decided to make good on their pledge.

Aliénor Debrocq MAISON MIROIR

(The Mirror House) Le Rouergue, May 2022, 352 pages



Exploring the twin themes of communities coinhabiting and feminist emancipation, Aliénor Debrocq serves up a complex portrait of two women at a time of crisis in their lives which prompts them to examine their fundamental values.

In a residential district where property prices are becoming unaffordable, there is a house that has been divided into two semi-detached properties by a thin partition through which all the shouting, whispering and laughter from next door can be heard.

On one side live Rose, her husband and their young daughter Goldilocks. Rose has just lost a baby during pregnancy and is silently going through a depression punctuated by guilty lesbian desires. On the other side is Nour, the secretly rebellions daughter of a large Moroccan family who is trapped between an urge to be loyal and a sense of suffocating. She feigns submission while constantly pushing at the boundaries imposed on her gender.

The neighbours are not on good terms, one side exasperated by all the noise coming through the partition, and several generations couped up on top of each other on the other side. One day as she is browsing in a department store, Rose bumps into Nour, who works there, and after this encounter the two women can no longer ignore each other. They are troubled by questions about their femininity, the forcefulness of their physical urges, and their identity in a world tailored to men, and find themselves irresistibly drawn to each other.

The first two parts of the book focus in turn on the characters of Rose and Nour, while in the third part the supporting actors occupy centre stage: Rose's husband Roger, who has never been able to forget Yamila, his father's second wife; Nour's elder brother, a strict type but in fact more tormented than he appears, and her parents, who still identify with the more temperate and tolerant Islam of their youth; and Soraya the Moroccan cousin, who is a campaigner for women's rights.

ABOUT THE AUTHOR: Aliénor Debrocq teaches literature and storytelling in art schools in Brussels. She has published numerous works, including the novels LE TIERS SAUVAGE (Éditions Luce Wilquin, 2018) and CENT JOURS SANS LILY (ONLIT Éditions, 2020). Wendy lives with her brother Willy in an abandoned ski resort on the remote north shore of the St. Lawrence. Wendy's world is limited, confined to the hotel, the mountain, and the chairlift. On her 35th birthday, her old friend Louise Fowley shows up unannounced with a surprise for Wendy: a picnic for the three of them on the summit.

With her return to Mont-Brun, memories come flooding back to Louise of the time in the 1990s when she was inseparable from Marco, the son of the local kingpin, and Willy and Wendy's younger brother, Laurence. Their adventures often took place in an old car, a Ply- mouth, abandoned in the middle of the woods, a place full of discoveries and danger.

The trio broke up when they reached adulthood. Louise was forced to move to Montreal and became a chic, urbane woman. Marco wanted to start over in Labrador. The two followed strikingly different paths, destined to never meet again, sharing only a mutual wish to forget Laurence and the wound that never healed.

With a unique talent of raconteur, Anaïs Llobet blends History with a capital H with that of the ghost town of Varosha, a seaside resort in Cyprus, where, in the middle of summer 1974, time suddenly stopped, and a family's future was devastated.

In Varosha, formerly a coastal town where Hollywood stars came to holiday, time stopped in 1974 when Turkey invaded the north of Cyprus. Since then, this district of Famagouste has been deserted, the prisoner of barbed wire and the bougainvillaea that rise up in the middle of houses, where, formerly, life was in full swing. These days, in Nicosie, a divided town, a young woman called Ariana clears the tables of the Tis Khamenis Polis, the café of the 'Lost Town' where the inhabitants of Varosha used to meet. Today they have nothing: no past, no roots, no future and no certitudes. A former student of architecture, she now has only one hope: to be able, one day, to rebuild the house her father was born in, and where her grand-parents, Aridné and Ioannis, lived. She knows only snippets of their lives, as though the makeshift barriers forbidding access to Varosha had also blocked access to their memory.... and their secrets. When Ariana learns that the house is to be demolished by Turkish bulldozers, and that the story of Aridné and Ioannis will disappear with the walls, the young woman, with the help of a writer - a captivating double of the author - decides to do everything she can to save what is left of the family memory and understand the weighty secret that burdened her ancestors.

The quest trans-forms him and he emerges from it more a man than a teenager, consumed by desire and passion. And he also finally discovers his father's identity, which Ar- gentina had hidden from him all these years by claiming that he was dead. Can he bring himself to accept his long line of descent?

It is a true mosaic: a fresco of human society and of characters who have suffered too long from the code of silence imposed by their families and their origins. And it is also the story of the village of Ogliano and those who live within its walls, and of the high plateaux, the cemeteries, the caves, and the grandeur of the landscapes.







She has also forgotten her actual first name, has learnt how to live with fear, and above all she has learnt how to pre- tend in order to survive in the presence of this man who has given her a daughter named Rosalie. A child who has never left this almost invisible detached house in the suburbs of Paris, hidden amidst the vegetation of a garden. When the story begins, Rosalie is 35 years old.

And then one morning everything comes crashing down: the man has a heart attack and the door fi- nally opens onto an alternative life and a freedom that obliges these women to rebuild their mental worlds in order to testify to what they have endured and reappropriate a sense of identity that has been taken from them.

Self-isolating is not always a healthy affair. Japan has fallen prey to a growing phenomenon that sometimes strikes as early as adolescence. Known as hikikomori, there are people who withdraw from the world and live as hermits, their only interaction with the outside world being through their computer screens and/or their bedroom doors.

This state of affairs can sometimes last for years, and it would seem that this form of social isolation has begun to extend beyond the borders of Japan. One day Lucas has an exam at the faculty but realises that he's no longer up to it. So he goes home and effectively im- prisons himself in what feels like a slightly uncom- fortable observation post. He knows the situation is untenable over the longer term and yet he feels relatively protected.

By contrast, the ultra-sensitive Mélanie seeks to navigate the unpredictable vicissitudes of life, em- bracing the margins of society on instinct, partying, and venting her anger at various demonstrations. An academic without tenure and a researcher in psychology and sociology, she is politically engaged and has not entirely given up on the idea of changing the world. She is lucid, but rebellious nevertheless.

And then there is Michel, a plastic surgeon from the moneyobsessed generation who hides his demons behind the slick façade of success and is building his empire on the fragilities of other people. In the face of the exponentially rising demands of contempo- rary life, he places his expertise at the service of the countless ways in which people seek to boost their egos. He is not taken in by the system, but he does intend to take full advantage of it, no matter what risks that may entail.

She feels herself to be imbued with two cultures, French and Senegalese, both of which have shaped her. Her partner Emmanuel, who is retired and is passionate about sculpture, knows Africa well and is madly fond of their daughter Aurore. Vivienne is getting worn out by her studies, which do not fit very well with being a mother. She suggests to Emmanuel that they send Aurore to stay with her mother in Senegal for a year while she finishes her thesis. He is not aware that of late Vivienne has been experiencing the first symptoms of dementia and that he will never see his daughter again.

On her journey, Vivienne crosses paths with several people who unwittingly help her to carry out her tragic act. She seems to be acting mechanically and blindly. As soon as she has committed her crime, her visions cease and her nervous crises vanish. Is it possible that someone had cast a spell on her, as she later claims at her trial? That jealous women from her village had bewitched her? But in France, such tales are regarded as mere superstitions...



At the age of 17, Nora Lefevbre is bored with her stultifying adolescent existence. She lives with her parents who accord her little attention. But when she begins her last year at school, an encounter breaks the monotony: her philosophy teacher, Anna Berl, initiates her into love, books and the exclusive social circles of the local bourgeoisie. Nora learns everything that young people who want to 'succeed' need to know: feigning an interest in emerging artists, winegrowers, and analysts wedded to the Freudian Cause. A few years later she becomes a philosophy teacher. But in Paris her teaching responsibilities soon take a back seat to going out. By chance, she crosses paths with the head of the one of the most prestigious publishing houses. The man, who has just hit sixty, asks her to become his personal secretary and help him to write his memoirs, which include details of his sexual fantasies... A network of dangerous liaisons develops between Nora, Anna and Maurice and a brutal game of ambition, desire, betrayal and vengeance plays itself out.

Rome 1968. The director Luchino Visconti sees a demonic apparition in the half light in his apartment. This creature inspires his film The Damned and takes him into a downward spiral.

Los Angeles 1968. The B-series producer Bob Cresse is in preproduction on a film that will, in his words, "revolutionise the history of cinema". The first feature film to depict Nazi sex slaves, Love Camp 7 would turn this pioneer into a pariah.


Khartoum 1974. The filmmaker Leni Riefenstahl, who instituted much of the Nazi aesthetic with her propaganda films, embarks on a photographic expedition to South Sudan, hoping to capture the "eternal beauty" of the Nuba people and to erase her own past.





Despite being abandoned by his young lover Francesco, and despite the yellow star that he obstinately refuses to wear to high-society lunches and evaluations of artworks, M. Paul forces himself to find reasons not to follow the ex- ample of his fellow writers and Dada artists, who have fled Paris and in some cases France altogether. A non-practising Jew, M. Paul does not believe in the Nazis either — until the day when he is arrested and deported to Auschwitz.

Five people, whose existence is intimately linked to the work of the musician, then set off headlong in search of the precious document, in a context where truth and lies, sincerity and pretense are constantly colliding. In the most disturbing of ways. But as always in the novels of Hélène Gestern, these five men and women, over the diabolical game of chess in which they will have to take part, are gradually led to question their past, their loves, their hopes and their mistakes, thanks to a quest that will permanently change their lives.

Scarlatti, brilliant composer with 555 sonatas, is the common thread of this "musical" novel. Its captivating music is the soundtrack. And it does not matter, ultimately, whether to add a 556th.

An intimate 20th-century saga told through the thwarted fates of three musicians whose lives overlap with both World War II and the Cold War.

The novel opens with the famous concert conducted by Wilhelm Furtwangler, a symbol of resistance to Nazism when the Bayreuth Festival reopened. A concert that was attended by Antonin Tcherniakovsky, a Soviet officer posted to Berlin.

Like so many others, Antonin Tcherniakovsy's life was overturned by World War II. Although he had been preparing for a career as a violinist, history decided otherwise. Having enlisted in the Polish division, he was in France early in the war. After the defeat, he winds up interned in Switzerland, where he meets a young woman, Alberte, the novel's other main character. She is teaching the interns French, but she too, had wanted to be a violonist.

The third major character is the narrator, who is unnamed. Perhaps because his own life story seems to elude his grasp. There are so many questions he would have liked to be able to ask Alberte, his mother, who hardly knew how to love him. And there's that stranger from his past, who seems to have been there, at a distance, ever since. His quest, which has the feel of a thriller at times, takes him to both Rome and Berlin, and will, despite the obstacles, allow him to reconnect with his buried past.

His old accomplice Montanelli, now editor-in-chief, tells him about the latest story: in a little village in the south of Italy, something very strange has happened. The inhabitants of a run-down building were found frozen, like statues, with no reasonable explanation. It sounds like something that Buzzati might have dreamed up, and who better than Dino to go investigate? He hesitates, but then agrees, unable to resist the call of mystery... Besides, he wants to finish his reporting career with a bang.

Little by little, Buzzati's investigation will become an investigation on himself as the people that he meets and the events that he experiences remind him of his life and work. At the crossroads between metaphysical detective novel and romanticized biography, we walk the fine line between dream and reality.

Barthelemy, a brilliant ophthalmologist, lived as a child with blind people in the institution directed by his father. A gifted student, he dedicated himself to studying the eye and successfully developed cataract surgery. During the Paris Commune of 1871, he provided care to the injured demonstrators, and as a result was forced into exile in the Americas. There, he met Kitsidano, a young Native American, blind at birth, but who was able to see what could not be seen, and became his wife. The three of them met in Paris, at Barthelemy's practice where Paul Cézanne went for consultations. Their friendship was born out of their shared passion for "the first sight". If Cézanne was fascinated by Barthelemy's work, he was equally struck by the astonishing personality of Kitsidano with whom he shared an almost shamanic sensitivity, and who would eventually refuse the surgery which could give her back her eyesight, preferring instead to retain her inner vision.







Notably, we are introduced to François Prévost, who is in charge of the investigation and cannot help but be moved by the human drama that he witnesses every day.

With its direct, merciless style, L'HOMME AUX CHATS grips the reader from the very first page.

An investigation into the past of an enigmatic woman in her fifties, who disappeared at the age of 18. This novel recounts a Machiavellian machination, remarkable for its virtuosity and full of wit.

Susan Boyer, the only daughter of the wealthy Belgian couple Hélène and Gilbert Boyer, is abducted under mysterious circumstances in 1985. The ransom demanded is a sumptuous piece of jewellery owned by the family which is a copy of a famous royal necklace. But the handover goes badly wrong – the police are accused of intervening ineptly, while the parents are accused of acting impetuously and against the advice of the authorities. The upshot is that the ransom is never recovered and all trace is lost of Susan. What has become of her? Could she have been behind her own disappearance – was she an accomplice of the kidnappers? Does one have the right to mourn her fate, or should one cast judgement on her?

Thirty-four years later, the necklace will feature in a subtle but implacable plot that will finally lift the veil on the actors in this drama. A book full of engaging and intriguing characters, an ironic tone, and delicious dialogues – all of Sophie Endelys' trademarks are present and correct.
